

## **A Christian Reflection on Job Searching and Avoiding Responsibility**

In every job search, there comes a moment when the pressure feels heavy, the process feels slow, and the responsibilities feel overwhelming. Applications pile up, interviews require preparation, and follow-up emails demand discipline. In those moments, many of us become “skippers”—people who dodge duties, delay action, or quietly slip away from what God is calling us to do.

Sheila once joked with her friend, “Give a man enough rope, and he’ll hang himself.” Lori replied, “I gave my husband enough rope, and he skipped out.” Their humor reveals a deeper truth: skipping out is a common human tendency. Whether in relationships, ministry, or the workplace, we often look for the nearest exit when things get uncomfortable. The job search is no different. Instead of updating the résumé, we scroll. Instead of applying, we procrastinate. Instead of trusting God, we retreat.

David understood this temptation. In the Psalms, he longed for wings to escape betrayal and turmoil. His heart was crushed under the weight of pressure and disappointment. Yet David didn’t skip out—he cried out. He turned to God rather than turning away from responsibility. His example reminds us that the desire to flee is human, but the decision to stay faithful is holy. Scripture captures his resolve: *“As for me, I call to God, and the Lord saves me”* (Psalm 55:16).

Jonah, on the other hand, tried to skip God’s assignment entirely. Called to preach in Nineveh, he boarded a ship going the opposite direction. His attempt to escape didn’t bring relief—it brought a storm, a fish, and a humbling return to obedience. Many job seekers experience a similar pattern. Avoiding the work God places before us doesn’t create peace; it creates anxiety, stagnation, and missed opportunities for growth.

The apostle Paul also experienced the pain of someone skipping out. Demas, once a coworker in ministry, abandoned the mission because he “loved this present world.” His departure didn’t strengthen him; it weakened his spiritual footing. Skipping responsibility rarely leads to blessing.

In the Christian job search, faithfulness matters. God honors diligence, perseverance, and trust. Proverbs reminds us, *“Commit to the Lord whatever you do, and he will establish your plans”* (Proverbs 16:3). When we commit our efforts to Him—even the tedious parts—He guides our steps.

So if you’re tempted to skip a task, delay an application, or avoid a difficult conversation, pause. Pray. Ask the Lord for strength to stay the course. He sees your effort, hears your cries, and sustains your journey. Like David, call on God in your

**distress. He will steady your heart, strengthen your hands, and lead you into the work He has prepared for you.**
