

Faith-Driven Interview Strategies to Pursue Your God-Given Career Path

Preparing for a job interview can feel overwhelming, especially in a competitive job market. Yet as Christian professionals, we approach this journey with a unique confidence — not in ourselves alone, but in the God who orders our steps. “The steps of a good man are ordered by the Lord, and He delights in his way” (Psalm 37:23). Whether your interview is virtual or in person, your preparation becomes an act of stewardship — a way of honoring the opportunities God places before you. These faith-centered strategies will help you prepare with excellence, walk in peace, and present yourself with clarity and confidence.

1. Gain Clarity About Your Calling and the Role Ahead

3. Prepare Thoughtful Responses to Common Interview Questions

Interviews often include predictable questions, but your answers should reflect authenticity, wisdom, and the unique story God is writing in your life.

Common questions to prepare for:

Bring:

- Printed résumé
- Portfolio samples
- Reference list
- Any required forms
